### ANNEX D

#### PROGRAMS FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE COMMUNITY - PBC

##### 1. Item

In accordance with that provided for in clause 10.1 of the Agreement, the Programs for the Benefit of the Community - PBC -, must encompass a number of social investment activities and/or projects defined by the Contractor as part of its contractual obligations, to contribute with some benefits that correspond to the needs of towns located in the Area of Interest of the PBCs, pursuant to that defined in Annex D.

These programs must be intended to contribute to the improvement of life quality and conditions of the people in the Areas of Interest and with the economic and social development of the territory and the region where the Contractor operates, in a supplementary and concurrent manner with the actions of the State and in accordance with the terms and conditions of Annex D.

Furthermore, the PBCs must be defined according to the Sustainable Development Goals - SDG -, the goals established for Colombia in CONPES 3918 of 15 March 2018, if the poverty measurement indicators such as the Multimodal Poverty Index - MPI - set out in Law 1785 of 2016, or other indicators, intended to promote sustainable development and strengthening of the social, cultural and economic environment of the Areas of Interest.

The PBCs must be different than the programs and projects that the Contractor is bound to undertake in compliance with the Environmental Licenses and Management Plans EMP), or in implementing Management Measures agreed upon in prior consultation procedures to prevent, correct, mitigate and/or compensate impacts derived from the performance of the Contract on ethnic groups, or compensation measures for the use of free trade zones, or which it intends to undertake as tax payment or offsetting, royalties or other accounts or considerations, all of that subject to the legal framework.





## 2. Background and Regulatory Framework

2.1 Article 5 of Decree Law 1760 of 2003, amended by article 4 of Decree Law 4137 of 2011 and likewise by article 3 of Decree 714 of 2012, in section 7 sets forth the following as part of the ANH functions: *"To agree, in the exploration and exploitation contracts, the terms and conditions under which the contracting companies will carry out programs for the benefit of the communities located in the areas of influence of the respective contracts."*

2.2 Through Agreement No. 5 of 23 September 2011, the Steering Council of the ANH defined the PBCs and established the parameters for performance of such Programs for the Benefit of the Community:

- a) The companies must ensure citizen participation, in accordance with constitutional mandates, in the definition and monitoring of the PBC, in the area of direct influence, through their legitimate representatives.
- b) The definition and planning of the PBCs must consider at least the comprehensive characterization of the social, cultural and economic environment of the influence areas of the projects. It is fundamental to have coherence of the PBCs with the Environmental Impact Assessments and the respective Environmental and Social Management Plans required by the environmental authority.
- c) The PBCs must be framed by transparency criteria and respect for Human Rights, as well as the rights of ethnic minorities recognized in international law and treaties, based on clear data and effective communication aimed at providing adequate information, knowledge and participation of the beneficiary communities; this is aimed also at promoting a differential approach with positive discrimination for adequate protection of the constitutional guarantees of ethnic groups and communities out of the territories that have been legally constituted through the application of ethical, systematic trends for the progressive development of the communities.
- d) The PBCs must be in harmony with the Local, Departmental Plans, Living Plans and Territorial Organization Plans, and within the concept of Sustainable development with respect to the use of natural resources.





### 3. Planning, Execution, Monitoring and Evaluation

The planning, preparation, execution, monitoring and evaluation of the Programs for the Benefit of the Community Be - PBC - must take into account the following benchmarks:

#### 3.1 Guiding Principles

The PBC must be prepared in accordance with the principles listed herein below:

- a) **Coordination and concurrence:** this refers to the relationship with the local and territorial authorities as regards social investment during the formulation, execution, monitoring and closing stages of the PBCs, in order to advise and listen to them, so that their actions turn to be supplementary and aimed at achieving the objectives and goals set out in the Program.

It is noted that the social investment agreement will continue to be managed by the Contractor and the Community, reporting to the local or territorial authorities accordingly, as the case may be.

In this regard, during the PBC definition and formulation stage, according to the coordination and concurrence principles, it is necessary to guarantee that the local and regional authorities (if applicable) will be informed about the process and that the defined projects will be in harmony with some current planning document (Community Development Plans PDCC, Development Programs with a Territorial Approach - PDET, PDN, POT, PND, Life Plan, National Action Plan on Human rights and Business, and other territorial planning instruments).

Similarly, the PBC definition process, if necessary, can be accompanied by the ANH, if it deems it necessary or if required by the Contractor, the communities or other social stakeholders.

- b) **Pertinence:** The PBC must be consistent with the priorities and needs of the communities in the Area of Interest and the development plans with which it integrates.
- c) **Feasibility:** this refers to the actual capacity of executing the proposed PBC.
- d) **Efficiency:** adequate use of resources for the achievement of the objectives set.





- e) **Efficacy:** capability for achieving the objectives set out during the formulation and execution of the PBC within the established times.
- f) **Positive impact:** promote improvement of life quality among the target population.
- g) **Sustainability:** promote the sustainability of projects that are part of the PBC, in coordination with government agencies and the communities.
- h) **Community participation:** it is the obligation of the community to participate in every stage of the PBC, that is, since it is proposed by providing space and information required by the Contractor to identify the needs and opportunities for development and to prioritize the projects; in the execution of the projects by honoring the commitments acquired; and in the closing of the PBC to know its outcome, receive the projects, accept their role for their sustainability, and contributing lessons learned.

### 3.2 State Policy

In accordance with the needs identified in the participation exercises developed with the local communities and authorities, the PBCs must consider the public policies applicable to each of the investment lines defined in this Annex.

A reference of public policy to overcome extreme poverty will be Law 1785 of 2016, which is intended to promote the structuring and implementation of projects aimed at social innovation, with participation of the public and private sectors, including civil society organizations, to supplement the State social services for the benefit of the population in extreme poverty conditions, and designing escalation routes at various levels to overcome it.

### 3.3 Nature of the obligation

The duties and commitments of the Contractor regarding the PBCs are obligations of means rather than of results, to the extent that their success depends in part on external factors that are beyond the control of the Contractor. This circumstance must be considered when assessing its compliance. Anyhow, the Contractor is bound to act with due diligence in the process of planning, defining, executing, monitoring and measuring the effect or impact of the respective investment. Furthermore, even though it is the obligation of the Contractor to monitor and measure it during contract performance, the PBC is considered satisfactorily fulfilled once the activities have been completed and the ANH has issued a statement in this regard.





### 3.4 Tools for preparation of the PBC

For preparation of the PBCs, the Contractor must keep in mind the guidelines prepared and provided by the ANH for such purpose, as well as the formats defined to standardize the presentation and content of the deliverables, subject to the requisites and terms of this Annex.

Hence, for the formulation, definition and execution of the PBCs, the Contractor may consult the following guidelines:

- a) "Methodological Guide for Management of Programs for the Benefit of the Community, PBC, focused on Human Development and Reduction of Extreme Poverty in Colombia", issued under Cooperation Agreement No. 302 of 2012 between the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) and the ANH, which in this Annex is referred to as Guide.
- b) Technical Guide of Good Social Practices - GTC 250: ICONTEC technical standard and others issued or updated by the ANH.

### 3.5 Definition of the PBCs

#### 3.5.1 Base Line

The PBCs must be defined from a base line considering the following criteria:

- a) Analysis of diagnoses corresponding to the PBC Areas of Interest defined by the Contractor, which may be consulted in the National Planning Department and the Social Prosperity Department, such as the "Multidimensional Poverty Index, MPI, the "Sustainable Development Goals - SDG", or others that are available at local, regional and national level.
- b) In addition to considering the available diagnostic information on Areas of Interest, the Contractor must carry out the characterization of the setting where the PBCs will be conducted, guaranteeing citizen participation.
- c) Based on the base line analyses, the Contractor must identify indicators corresponding to the needs of populations located in the Area of Interest of the PBC to then assess the effect or impact of its social investment.

Indicators are understood as the data that reflects the conditions of a particular situation or aspect at a given time and location, which can be expressed as percentage, rate, etc. Such





data can be used to show changes and progress obtained through the execution of social investment projects. Example: Potable water coverage.

### 3.5.2 Projects and Activities

Social investment must be intended for "Socially Sustainable" projects or activities. In this regard, each investment initiative can have one or more activities and/or projects that contribute to social, economic, environmental and/or cultural development related to:

- a) Productive inclusion and income generation, incorporating employment, entrepreneurship, productive, agro-environmental, agro-industrial and training projects, aimed at achieving or strengthening diversification of the local economy.
- b) Social infrastructure, which includes improving housing, potable water, public utilities and basic sanitation, education, health and connectivity infrastructure (roads, IT technology and communications), culture, sports and recreation.
- c) Any other that is contained in municipal, departmental and national development plans, living or territorial planning, or community and community development plans, all of them within the notion of sustainable development and including sectors such as health, education, and the environment.

The Contractor shall define actions aimed at guaranteeing the sustainability of the investment projects defined within the framework of the PBC.

The Contractor is empowered to propose entering into agreements or covenants intended for planning, proposing, executing and verifying joint PBCs, as well as to jointly carry out social investment related thereto, pursuant to the respective legal business.

In this context, the Contractor can identify strategic partners such as national, regional and/or local entities, private sector, non-profit organizations and other hydrocarbon companies, social or community organizations that have planned or ongoing projects to meet the needs identified in the characterization conducted by the stakeholders, which lead to optimizing the amounts, outcomes and sustainability of projects prioritized in the PBCs.

## 3.6 Minimum amount of investment in the PBC.

### 3.6.1 General Considerations





- a) Resource investment in the development of the PBC must , at least, to a sum equivalent to one percent (1%) of the Total Value of the Exploration Program, including Minimum and Additional of each Phase of the **Exploration Period**, and the eventual Subsequent and Evaluation Exploration Programs, Retention and Evaluation, as well as one per cent (1%) of the amount of the Annual Operations Program of all Commercial Fields of the Area or Areas in Production (including the infrastructure development stage).

When the Contractor decides to invest more than 1%, in the presentation of the Program to the ANH it shall state if such additional investment will be as part of the PBC or as voluntary social investment.

- b) The effective investment in each of the PBCs for this Contract equivalent to 1% must neither include personnel, logistic, administrative, infrastructure project auditing costs, nor other indirect costs and expenses incurred by the Contractor for the full execution of the respective PBC. An exception is the administration, contingent and profit cost (AIU for its Spanish acronym) in infrastructure projects, **which** cannot exceed 20%.
- c) The Final Execution Report for each PBC must be accompanied by a certification of the investment effectively carried out, signed by the Statutory Auditor, the External Auditor, the Internal Auditor or "Controller" and, in their absence, by the Public Accountant responsible for the accounting records of the Contractor Operations, or the competent party of the entity or company with which the latter has entered into an agreement or covenant for its joint execution.

## 36.2 External Audit

The Contractor must hire an external audit responsible for certifying the formulation (definition) and execution of the PBC in accordance with the terms and conditions set out in in this Annex.

The certification of the definition process of the PBC, attached to the audit report, must be provided to the ANH along with the PBC to be assessed for the respective stage of the Contract. The scope of the external audit in the definition stage is to audit and certify that the PBC in fact meets the principles and conditions set out in the PBC Annex.

The PBC execution certification, along with the audit report, must be part of its Final Report, highlighting compliance with the guiding principles of the PBC for this stage, including PBC monitoring and closing activities, and identifying the outcome, goals and objectives achieved.





The external audit, if not having specific auditing experience, must have certified background and experience related to corporate social responsibility programs and activities.

### 3.6.3 US Dollar Market Representative Rate - MRR.

For planning purposes of the respective PBC and its overseeing by the ANH, the amount of the respective social investment must be translated into Colombian Pesos (COP) applying the US Market Representative Rate, MRR, as follows:

In regard to PBCs approved by the ANH but which have not started their execution for reasons not attributable to the Contractor after two (2) years or more since their approval and that must be updated, the Contractor must so advise the ANH in writing, and this submittal date will be considered as the new MRR of the PBC that is to be updated. It is considered necessary to update the PBC in the following events:

- a) Change of the area of interest.
- b) Change of the investment line or investment projects.
- c) Scope adjustment aimed at better coordination with current planning instruments.

### 3.6.4 Transfer of Exploration Activities and/or Investments not executed





### 3.6.4.1 Transfers from the original Agreement

When the ANH approves a Transfer of Exploration Activities or Investments not executed, corresponding to commitments agreed on in the Minimum, Additional or Subsequent Exploration Programs, where the execution of activities related to the PBC in the original Agreement have not been started, the Contractor shall request separately from the ANH the authorization to adjust the PBC terms and conditions approved in the original Agreement, in order to make adjustments to the amount equivalent to 1% of the value of investments not transferred from the respective exploration period phase, including the design and execution of the PBC closing, not affecting either the integrity of the project or the engagement with the stakeholders.

In the event that the execution of the PBC has not started in the original Agreement, the full amount of the PBC will be part of the activity transfer, maintaining the terms and conditions of the PBC in the initial Agreement and making adjustments for the new Area of Interest.

### 3.6.4.2 Transfer to the receiving Agreement

When the ANH approves a Transfer of Exploration Activities or Investments not executed that correspond to the agreements made under the Minimum, Additional or Subsequent Exploration Programs of this Agreement, the Contractor shall submit for approval of the ANH the change to the PBC that is being performed, or a new PBC, for an additional amount equivalent to 1% of the transferred value. Such amendment or new PBC must be defined and executed as per the terms and conditions set out in this Annex.

The request for amendment of the PBC both in the original Agreement and the receiving Agreement, or the submittal of a new PBC in the receiving Agreement must be registered with the ANH in a term not to exceed ninety (90) Business Days as of the date in which the ANH notifies to the Contractor the authorization for the transfer of the exploration activities and/or non executed investments.

### 3.7 Follow up and Monitoring

During the execution of the PBCs, the Contractor must carry out periodical follow up and continuously monitor their development.

The ANH is, in turn, responsible for overseeing and monitoring their execution.

## **4. Area of Interest of the Programs for the Benefit of the Community**

This refers to the delimitation or territorial scope of the geographical area that will benefit from the PBC projects and/or activities.





Given the particular aspects of this Agreement in relation with the distances to the coast line and the absence of settlements within the area of influence of the exploration, evaluation or production project, and the importance of strengthening the engagement with the stakeholders, the delimitation of the Area of Interest of the PBC must be defined by the Contractor, taking into account at least one of the following considerations:

- a. The zones devoted for installing and commissioning of locations, camps, easements, tertiary roads of permanent use due to operational needs, as well as supplementary areas for loading and unloading and other facilities where the Contractor operates during the **Exploration Period, as well as during the infrastructure and production development stage. The Contractor must locate the zones, roads and areas referred to in this numeral, identifying the respective territorial unit: village, town, rural district, district sector, neighborhood or other units recognized in the political, administrative or social division or by the Ministry of Interior (in cases in which ethnic communities are established in those areas).**
- b. Districts or Municipalities located in the Caribbean or Pacific region, classified in fifth or sixth category in the year in which the CBP is proposed, or marginal zones of Districts and Municipalities classified in other categories.
- c. The Contractor may coordinate with municipal or regional projects that are underway; in such event, the areas of interest will be defined by the prioritized project(s).

The definition of the CBP Area of Interest by the Contractor must be submitted to the ANH in the proposal of the CBP duly justified and subject to the terms of this Annex.

## **5. Execution, Stages and Deliverables**

The obligations inherent in the formulation, design, execution and monitoring of the PBCs start on the Effective Date, as of commencement of the First Phase (Phase 1) of the Exploration Period. These may coincide with the eventual Retention and Evaluation Programs and with the Area or Areas in Production, as shown in the following table:

## 6. Term for execution of the PBCs

The term for execution of the PBCs must be equal to the term for each phase of the Exploration Period, or the term for eventual Subsequent and Evaluation Exploration Programs, Retention and Evaluation and Infrastructure Development Stage.





With regard to the Production Period, the execution term shall not exceed the term set out in the schedule (with its updates) approved by the ANH for each PBC.

The Contractor can eventually request the ANH for authorization to extend the term of execution of the PBC, provided that the reasons for not having executed the PBC during the respective phase or period are not attributable to it and it has acted in a diligent manner throughout the whole definition, approval and execution process of the respective PBC. The extension of the term for executing a PBC shall not constitute an extension of the term for the corresponding phase.

In the event of occurrence of force majeure or third party events that affect the schedule of the PBC and, consequently, its execution term, which were not considered in the risk management document or map of the PBC, the Contractor must update said document or map and submit it to the ANH. This information will be taken into account if it is necessary to extend the term for execution of the PBC.
